### Lent Begins...



Some of us haven't even taken down all of the Christmas lights and we are getting ready for the Lenten season. Ash Wednesday is February 17 and Easter falls on April 4 in 2021. Early in the Church's history, the major events in Christ's life were observed with special observances, such as His birth, baptism, death, resurrection and ascension. As these observances developed, a period of time was set aside prior to the major events of Jesus' birth and resurrection as a time of preparation.

During Lent, the Church's worship assumes a more penitential character. The color for the season is purple, a color often associated with penitence. The "Hymn of Praise" is omitted from the liturgy. The word "Alleluia" is usually omitted as well. By not using the alleluia—a joyful expression meaning "Praise the Lord"—until Easter, the Lenten season is clearly set apart as a distinct time from the rest of the year. Additionally, it forms a powerful contrast with the festive celebration of Jesus' resurrection when our alleluias ring loud and clear.

Finally, the penitential character of Lent is not its sole purpose. In the ancient Church, the weeks leading up to Easter were a time of intensive preparation of the candidates who were to be baptized at the Easter vigil on Holy Saturday. This time in the Church's calendar was seen as an especially appropriate time for Baptism because of the relationship between Christ's death and resurrection and our own in Holy Baptism (see Romans 6:1-11). This focus would suggest that the season of Lent serves not only as a time to meditate on the suffering that Christ endured on our behalf but also as an opportunity to reflect upon our own Baptism and what it means to live as a child of God.

You are invited to join us for our special mid-week services each Wednesday at 7:00 pm beginning on Ash Wednesday, February 17. Shepherd of the Valley will again partner with Bethel Lutheran Church as Pastors Walla, Wolfgram, and Woodside will each lead services and preach two sermons at each congregation over the six weeks. Elders of the congregation will serve a soup /sandwich supper prior to the Ash Wednesday service on February 17 at 6:00pm.

Service time at Bethel is 6:00 pm followed by Confirmation instruction (6:45) that will be led by the pastor who is not preaching at Bethel or SOTV that Wednesday.

The focus for the messages during these midweek services will be on the Epistle lessons appointed for the Sundays in Lent. Please join us during these services of somber preparation to hear God's Word, confess our sins, and receive God's refreshing pardon for all your sins.

#### **Help In Time Of Need**

<sup>35</sup> For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, <sup>36</sup> I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' <sup>37</sup> Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? <sup>38</sup> And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? <sup>39</sup> And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' <sup>40</sup> And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, <sup>[a]</sup> you did it to me.' The ring of my cell phone woke me at 2:15 am on Christmas Eve morning. It was a trooper from the North Dakota Highway Patrol calling for assistance. As a chaplain with the department, most of my early morning calls are a request to assist with a death notification. This call was different. Trooper Roth was trying to find a warm place of shelter for a man whom he discovered hitch-hiking on I-94 west of Mandan. It was a bitterly cold night and Trooper Roth was concerned for the well-being of the traveler. He asked me if I knew of any shelters in Bismarck where the man would be safe from the extremely cold temperatures. He had tried to call the homeless shelter to no avail.

I informed Trooper Roth that our congregation has a benevolence fund to assist people in dire straights and offered to pay for a hotel room for the traveler. I could hear the relief in Trooper Roth's voice. I made arrangements for the room with the receptionist at a local motel and told her that I would pick up the receipt in the morning. The traveler got a warm place to stay and Trooper Roth was able to get back to assisting others in keeping our roadways safe.

Over Thanksgiving weekend we helped a scared, young mom get back to her family in Wyoming and away from a very abusive and threatening relationship in the Bismarck area. We fed her a meal, purchased a bus ticket for her, and saw to it that she was safely on board the west bound bus.

The benevolence fund goes to help people in our congregation and community in their time of great need. The benevolence fund is the focus for the first quarter of giving in 2021 for human care. One percent of offerings, plus specified gifts, go to support the important ministry as we meet the physical needs of individuals and tell them about the love of Jesus.

We are also grateful to Cashwise for their generous support of our human care ministry through their gift card program. To date, we have received nearly \$2,000 in gift cards and distributed well over \$1,000 in gift cards to persons in need.


