Support Our Ministries by Simply Being a Thrivent Member *** URGENT DEADLINE FOR 2022 IS DECEMBER 31, 2022 ***

Thrivent encourages people to live generously. Thrivent clients can use the Thrivent Action Team Grant to amplify their impact as they live generously in their communities.

Description: The Thrivent "Action Teams" program is an opportunity for Thrivent members to lead projects that provide service and outreach to the community. Thrivent Financial will provide \$250 for each project for startup and associated expenses.

Requirements for Request:

You must be a Thrivent Benefit or Associate member (age 16 or older) to request approval for funds.

Benefit members: Those with a qualifying Thrivent insurance or annuity product are eligible for two Action Team events per calendar year - every year.

Associate members: Those paying an annual \$19.95 membership fee (includes all family members), purchasing a Thrivent investment product, or joining the Thrivent Federal Credit Union. Associate members are eligible for one event per calendar year (max. of three total events).

Calendar year qualification eligibility is the application date.

A Thrivent member must initiate the request (as stated above). There is no membership requirement for team volunteers.

Only one Thrivent member may apply for an event. Separate but reoccurring events may have one application per event (e.g., Martin Luther School events, soup packing events, Church maintenance).

You must apply online (thrivent.com/actionteam). You will need a Thrivent user code and password to log in. If you do not have an online computer, check with Michael (701-3001-9356) for help.

Guidelines for Application of Project Approval (only takes 5 – 10 minutes!):

The requested project and the \$250 donation must support a Fundraiser, Service, or Education event.

The requested project should aid individuals or local, national, or international non-profit organizations.

The requested project may be currently in use, or you may create a new idea to meet the needs of others.

The \$250 contribution from Thrivent is <u>not</u> a grant or gift to others. It is "seed" money for supplies, merchandise, materials, goods (including food), advertising, transportation, fees, and other costs for your project. Note: misuse of funds will jeopardize future projects.

The event and the \$250 grant benefit those in need.

Request for approval will require answering questions. If unsure of any information, call the "contact person" listed on the sign-up sheet or members who have previously sponsored a project.

What is the date of the event? At least 14 days after the application date and not more than 120 days after the application date.

What is the name and type of the project? A Fundraiser, Service, or Education event?

How did you learn about Action Teams?

Give a brief explanation of your project and goals.

How will you use the money?

What is the impact of the project? Check 1 or 2 choices.

Do you have a church relationship? Yes – Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church

Who will benefit from this project? Shepherd of the Valley or another organization/group of individuals?

Number of volunteers involved (team size)?

Do you want T-shirts, banners, invitations, cards, or name tags?

Where to send the package?

Be sure to click the box agreeing to all the conditions and then hit the send button.

Expect an email approval in 1-2 days and mail delivery of the Action Team kit in 7-10 days.

If Thrivent does not approve the grant request, not a problem, you will be able to apply for other future events.

The final decision to approve or deny a request is strictly up to Thrivent. Guidelines, requirements, and conditions may change at any time – please read your applications and mailings carefully to ensure full compliance.

After Receiving the Action Team Package:

Open and check the box contents (if you ordered supplies) and remove the Action Team Folder.

The \$250 debit card is in the folder - follow the instructions to activate the card and then sign the back. You are solely responsible for using the card to make purchases (max. amount is \$250). Use the card within 90 days after the project start date to avoid card expiration.

Coordinate and keep records of the project and volunteer activity - you will need this information for the follow-up report. Retain all receipts for up to one year.

Take pictures for SOTV publications and feedback for Thrivent (use the Thrivent T-shirts if available).

Follow-up of the project:

If you used SOTV (or other locations) facilities, please clean up and return everything to its original location. Respond to the "Report on Completed Project" to Thrivent online. If you do not report timely, they will send you a message to request the information. You will not be eligible for your next project until you complete the report.

The message from Thrivent will include questions about the project and its success. Be ready to provide information about the impact it made, the hours involved, and the number of volunteers that participated (they do not require personal information about the volunteers).

If pictures are available, download photos to Thrivent for their records (this step is optional).

Follow up with a brief message (and any pictures) to SOTV to include in our publications.

Additional Information: SOTV has created a list of activities at SOTV for possible Action Team funds. The display is on the bulletin board in the main entryway. Use the sheet with blue trim to sign-up for the project for which you want to apply for an Action Grant. The list covers projects arranged according to the start date. We will update information on a timely basis, allowing Thrivent members time to plan and apply for a project within the 2-week requirement. The advance sign-up will also eliminate the double request of any event and allow you to sign-up for your favorite projects year after year. If necessary, check with the church office for the latest information before applying.

We ask All SOTV members to look over the list and add any additional projects that you think would qualify. Just fill in all the information requested on the sheet with red trim. If you are not a Thrivent member, we will attempt to find a member to sponsor the project. Also, you can become a Thrivent Associate member for \$19.95/year and lead three events with \$250 seed money for each project (1 project/year for three years.)

We can use our creative talents and have fun doing it. SOTV will continue to use and find new ways to reach out and help those in need.

SOTV goal for 2022 is approval for ten projects to receive the \$250 donation. If we reach the goal, SOTV can direct \$2,500 of Thrivent's money in SOTV's name to share our service and mission projects with a generous commitment to reach out to others.

Jesus, in His Sermon on the Mount, teaches those who follow Him that worrying about the necessities of life is idolatry: worshipping a false god. Worry and anxiety show what we care about. Our anxiety reveals what we love and what we're devoted to. It reveals what we trust in.

This is why our Lord begins this section with an overarching principle: "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money" (Matt. 6:24).

But you say: "I must eat and drink. I must have clothing to wear and have a home in which to dwell." Yes, all these things you need. And Jesus says that your Father in heaven will ensure that you have them. He demonstrates this with a simple argument: your Father in heaven feeds the birds of the air, who neither sow, nor reap, nor gather into barns. He clothes the lilies of the field, who neither toil nor spin but are arrayed more luxuriously than Solomon in all his glory. If, then, your Father in heaven feeds the birds, if He clothes the lilies, how will He not also feed and clothe you, when you are worth more than they are? (Matt 6:25–33).

Do you know that you are worth more than them? You are worth infinitely more. You are worth the price of the eternal Son of God. Did the Son of God come down from heaven and become a lily? Did he descend and take on the form of a bird? No! He came down from heaven and became a man: flesh of our flesh and bone of our bone (Gen. 2:23). He is one of us, our brother. And what did He do when He became flesh to dwell among us? He gave His holy, precious blood, through His innocent suffering and death, that you might be His own and live under Him in His kingdom forever.

God became man in Christ Jesus. He lived the life we failed to live, and He died the death we deserved. He was raised again on the third day overcoming sin and death ... for us. He was crucified for our transgressions and raised for our justification. So, if your Father in heaven has given His Son to die for us in order that we might live with Him eternally, how will He not also give us all things to support this body and life?

To be anxious about the necessities of life, to devote yourself to food and clothing, to care about these things and find security in them, is to serve another god. It is to deny that you will live forever because Jesus, the Son of God, is risen from the dead and lives and reigns for all eternity. It is to believe that the God who created you, redeemed you by the death and resurrection of His Son and sanctified you by His Spirit, will not keep His promise to sustain you in this life.

Jesus says, "Seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness" (Matt. 6:33). God's kingdom is His rule among us. His rule among us comes when our Father in heaven gives us His Holy

Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His Holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity. This is what we ask God to do for us in the prayer that Jesus taught us.

Your Father in heaven knows what you need — food and clothing, house and home — and He promises to give it to you. Chief of the things you need is His grace and mercy in His Son, Jesus Christ. So, seek after that. And those who seek will find. And all the necessities of life, our Lord says, will be added to you.

Why I Am a Lutheran: Part 2
Who Does the Verbs?

How is a person to be saved? How can I be sure that I am going to heaven? These are very important questions. In my younger days I was taught that a person becomes a Christian by accepting Jesus as one's personal savior and asking Jesus into one's heart by *sincerely* praying the "Sinner's Prayer." What is the sinner's prayer, then? Well there are different versions of it, but essentially it goes something like this: *Dear Jesus. I confess that I am a sinner in need of forgiveness. Thank you for dying for my sins and rising from the dead. Please forgive me and come into my heart to be my Lord and Savior. Amen*

Now at first glance there doesn't seem to be anything wrong with this. The prayer confesses Jesus as Lord. It confesses HIs death and resurrection! What's wrong with asking Jesus into my heart? Nothing is obviously wrong with it. But when one squares this teaching up with scripture it doesn't hold up. First of all, this prayer is not found in scripture. The only prayer that Jesus explicitly taught is the Lord's Prayer! Not only that, but we read in John that one becomes a child of God, "not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God." (John 1:13b, ESV) We do not choose Jesus, He chooses us!

In the churches of my youth, if I were to ask a Pastor how I can be saved, he would have told me to sincerely say this prayer. But what does Peter say after his Pentecost sermon when asked this question? Does he direct them to accept Jesus? No. What does he say? Let's look at the passage:

"Now when they heard this they were cut to the heart, and said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" And Peter said to them, 'Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." (Acts 2:37-38, ESV)

He directs them to repent and be baptized. So why do so many churches ignore Peter's words? They do so to their own peril.

Reading this, you may find yourself wondering if Pastor Woodside is just being too nit-picky. Understand, first of all, that I am not saying that people who believe this false doctrine are not saved. I believe that many of them are. I believe that I was a Christian prior to becoming Lutheran! But I will tell you from experience that there is something spiritually dangerous about this "decision theology." The biggest issue is that it puts the responsibility for my salvation in my own hands. Did I say the sinner's prayer correctly (something that is difficult to know since it is not in scripture)? Was I really sincere when I said it? If not, should I say it again just in case?

Bearing the responsibility for my own salvation is not only unbiblical, but it is a crushing load. It is unbiblical because we know that our salvation is based on what Jesus has done, not on what I do (even if it is saying a simple prayer!) It crushes the spirit because I always find myself asking, "How can I ever be certain that I am saved?" When my eternal life is based on how sincerely I said it, I will always question that sincerity.

In Baptism we have an objective moment in which we are saved. Baptism is not, unlike the sinner's prayer, a work done by us. I may well have said the sinner's prayer hundreds of times, never being sure if it "took." But we need not question whether our baptism was done properly since it is done *to* us by God Himself and He cannot possibly do it *wrong*. We only need to be baptized once. With baptism we need not question our sincerity, since God is sincere *for* us. There is so much comfort and security in the true, biblical teaching on this issue, for through it we remember that Jesus bore the crushing load for us on the cross!
