Scripture

So let's look at scripture.

In Mark 10 we read this: account:"

And as he was setting out on his journey, a man ran up and knelt before him and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ¹⁸ And Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good except God alone. ¹⁹ You know the commandments: 'Do not murder, Do not commit adultery, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness, Do not defraud, Honor your father and mother." ²⁰ And he said to him, "Teacher, all these I have kept from my youth." (Mark 10:17-20, ESV)

If you want to know what God expects of a person morally, look no further than the 10 Commandments! These Commandments are a description of the righteous person. Here we have a guy who, from an outward perspective, was *good* person. He knew and tried, at least, to keep God's commandments. And yet, when he approaches Jesus, Jesus tells him that "No one is good except God alone." Why is it that no one is good but God alone? Because no one keeps all of the commandments. God keeps them. He not only keeps them, but they are a description of what He is like. He is the only one who is truly *good*.

In Romans, Paul writes:

"None is righteous, no, not one;

no one understands;

no one seeks for God.

¹²All have turned aside; together they have become worthless;

no one does good

not even one." (Rom 3:10b-12, ESV)

The fact is that all have sinned. Sure, you may be a *good* person *compared* with your neighbor. There are, no doubt, some people who are, on account of nature or upbringing, more kind and caring than others. But this is not the standard for goodness before a Holy God. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Rom 3:23, ESV) If you have sinned at any point (and you have), then you are accountable to the whole law. (James 2:10)

Returning to the account of the rich young man:

²⁰ And he said to him, "Teacher, all these I have kept from my youth ²¹ And Jesus, looking at him, loved him, and said to him, "You lack one thing: go, sell all that you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me." ²² Disheartened by the saying, he went away sorrowful, for he had great possessions. (Mark 10:20-22, ESV)

Sure, on the outside this man may have appeared holy, but he had an idol: money.

Recall the prophet Isaiah when he was confronted with the majesty of God, what was his response? ⁵ And I said: "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" (Isa 6:5, ESV)

No, dear friends, there is no one who is truly good but God alone! Jesus, the only truly good and righteous man to ever walk this planet, was unjustly murdered; crucified for you. In order to save us from our lack of true goodness, the very embodiment of goodness itself was killed. In this act He won salvation for all who believe in His name.

We cannot be saved by any of our own good works because, without Christ, none of them are even truly good! This is because we all have the fatal flaw of original sin, in which we are, at the core, not good. But in Christ we are born-again; declared righteous; declared truly good! We are new creations!

Paul writes, we were "**created in Christ Jesus for** *good* **works.**" (Eph 2:10) In our next article we will look at the concept of good works in the Christian's life. If we are not saved by works, why should we do them? Are good works necessary? (The answer, of course, is "Yes", but we will get to that next month.)

God Words Part 10: The Word "Good"

In the last article we looked at the word "heaven": what it is and what it is not. But how does one get there? The answer, of course, is by faith in Jesus. It is not on account of our works or *good* deeds, but solely on account of Jesus' death on the cross. This is the Gospel! This is the *good* news.

But then we think about people we know who have died, but who were really nice people, but not Christians. We may even find ourselves thinking that maybe *God ought to make an exception in these cases*! Why? Because they were such *good* people!

Good. This is the word we will be looking at for the next few articles. Notice above that I have italicized the word "good" several times.

- Good deeds.
- Good news.
- Good person.

Let's add:

- Good ice cream.
- Good morning.
- God is good!
- Good grief?

What does "good" even mean? Something that is not *bad*? It seems that the word can be used to refer to something as trivial as ice cream to someone as important as God Himself! Obviously, when we say that ice cream is *good* we do not mean the same thing as when we say that God is *good*. It seems likely that we also mean something different when we say that so-and-so is a *good* person. So what exactly does the word mean?

An Example

In this world, typically when we say that a person is a good person, what we mean by that is that he is a kind, trustworthy, law-abiding person. Now suppose this individual (we will call him Mr. Niceguy) is *not* a Christian. Would it be inappropriate to call him *good*? I think that it is appropriate in one sense. On a worldly level it is obviously better to be a kind, trustworthy, law-abiding person, than to be a vile, ruthless murderer. It would be true to say that Mr. Niceguy is *good*, especially compared with the vile, ruthless murderer.

But Mr. Niceguy may not be so good compared with Mr. Excellent next door.

In our fallen world we tend to measure goodness by comparing one thing with another. When I say that ice cream is good, I really mean that it is good in comparison with (fill in the blank with something you think is worse than ice cream.) On the other hand, I think that pizza is good too, but *better* than ice cream! So ice cream is *less good* than pizza.

So what is "good?" It is actually a more difficult question than it may at first appear. The ancient Greeks struggled with the concept of what they called "The Good," trying very hard, using human reason alone, to determine a definition. The closest they got was to say that there is something called "The Good". This "Good", whatever it is, is the ultimate good. It is not an *example* of goodness, it is goodness itself, and everything that we see that we call good is only good insofar as it is reflecting the true good. Okay, well that's a mouthful. But needless to say, this is the closest anyone has really got to defining good using just human reason.
